Vicar's Letter...

I've always loved Christmas!

As a Farmer's daughter I remember Christmas Day being very much a working day.

My sister and I would have to wait until Dad had finished milking and feeding the animals before we rushed down stairs to see if Father Christmas had been!

The anticipation in those moments of waiting, fueling so much excitement in us, we were ready to 'pop' by the time Mum shouted 'Come on girls'....I leave the rest to your imagination....

'Christmas is a time for children' I hear people say – but is that the case..?

Do you know what happens when a new is star is born?

Like people stars are born, they grow old and they die. Their birth-places are huge cold clouds of gas and dust, known as 'nebulas'. The most famous of these is the Orion nebula, which is just visible with the unaided eye.

These clouds start to shrink under their own gravity. As the cloud gets smaller, it breaks into clumps. Each clump eventually becomes so hot and dense that nuclear reactions begin. When the temperature reaches 10 million degrees Celsius, the clump becomes a new star.

Tushingham Armistice

On Remembrance Sunday, the residents of Tushingham, Macefen and Bradley Parish joined forces with Tushingham with Grindley primary school at a remembrance service with a difference. As part of the national Battle's Over tribute to mark the centenary of Armistice Day, 200 people gathered in the shippen at Yew Tree farm to remember the 18 members of the parish who died in the Great War and watch the Tushingham beacon being lit. The focus of the service was the formation of a magnificent array of 18 ceramic poppies, made by local artist Sara Wood, that were presented by Year 5 pupils of the school following their recital of a few lines on each of the fallen. The last post was sounded by local bugler Matt Willcox and the towering bonfire, built by special needs students from Derwen College, on the local high point of Wycherley's Bank was lit on the dot of 7 pm along with thousands of others across the country. With a military piper and Farndon brass band in accompaniment it was an extremely powerful service.
