Dear Friends,

The picture this week is one of my favourite pieces of religious art. This icon is by a Russian artist Andrei Rublev (1360-1427). It is entitled *The Trinity* and hangs in the Tretyakov Gallery in Moscow. There is a lot I could say about this painting, maybe one day I will get the chance to talk about it with you in more depth. This depiction of the Trinity

has always struck me, firstly because all the figures look very similar. I see in this picture a scene of equality and a comfort at being in each other's company, a serenity at being together. Which is the Father, Son or Holy Spirit? It does not matter. What matters to me is that, if you look closer, there is a space for a fourth person. The way the figures are seated, in an outlooking fashion, is almost as if they are welcoming you in to join them in that space at the table. Take a closer look...what do you see?

I am writing about the Trinity this week because this Sunday is Trinity Sunday where we reflect upon the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, the three in one. The word comes from the Latin: trinus, meaning 'threefold'. One God in three persons. The three persons are distinct and yet are one substance. The Trinity and its concept have been much discussed and many find it difficult to understand. To try and explain it simply, the comparison to water is used. We experience water in three distinct forms, solid ice, liquid water and water vapour (steam). Three very different forms but all one substance.

Ray Simpson in his lovely book Celtic Daily Light (2003), describes it like this:

"Sometimes the sun has been used as an illustration of the Trinity. There is the sun itself, which the human eye cannot directly look at, (God); there is the single ray that we can see at a particular time and place, (Jesus); and there is the sun's warmth which radiates, (Spirit)."

Here is a lovely little prayer about 'the three'; I found it in A Pocket Book of Celtic Prayers by Janet Donaldson:

Three things are pleasant in a home: good food upon the table; a man who lovingly kisses his wife; children who refrain from quarrelling.

Three attitudes are godly in the Church: true love of the Lord himself; kindness amongst the pews; a fair dealing with self.

Three ideas enlarge a person's mind: a humble heart; a generous soul; honesty in business.

*Three things I wish for myself: true spiritual beauty; a heart of giving; eyes with pools of meaning.*
