Dear Friends,

Cautiously and carefully our churches begin to open again. Everyone is trying to work out the best way of making sure everywhere is as safe as possible for our return. Some of us are still sheltering and many are cautious about venturing out, anxious about ourselves and loved ones. None of us are sure what a church service will look like now. For the moment we know there will be no singing, no sharing the peace, no books, no coffee or tea and a chat afterwards and, as yet in Marbury, no Communion. We will try to adapt to a new way of doing things and none of us is sure, as yet, what that will look like.

There is something significant about gathering together as a community in Christian worship that many of us have missed during this time. Our collective worship on a Sunday is important and has been very effectively moved to on-line sources by many churches over the past few months. We have encountered an abundance of ways we have been able to access worship in this new form of 'together but apart' gathering through many different platforms. We have all been engaging in worship in a very different way.

Wonderful as it is to gather together to worship, biblically, worship is a way of life. In his book Holy Habits, Andrew Roberts says that 'worship offered as grateful response for all God is and does involves all of our lives: our work, our rest, our enjoyment of creation, our service, our eating, our giving — and our gatherings with fellow disciples for the focused activity of praise and worship'. So, let us remember that, important as it may feel to have our church services back again, our worship and praise to our Creator God is something we can do anytime and anywhere! Alleluia!
