News from St Chad's

"A Friend," says the wise man, "is the medicine of life." Medicine may meet our physical needs, but perhaps these days medicine is too easily relied upon to meet other wounds in our soundness of mind or general well-being?

In 1143, Aelred, Abbott of Rievaulx (a North Yorkshire abbey), wrote, "What happiness, what security, what joy to have someone to whom you dare to speak on terms of equality as to another self; one to whom you need have no fear to confess your failings; one to whom you can unblushingly make known progress you have made in the heart and before whom you can place all your plans!" We need friends... Friendship brings something into our lives that nothing else can. In every necessity a friend's service, words, actions, understanding and love can raise our spirit more than any other pick-me-up! Wise council from a loving friend can bolster dark thoughts that can break us, upholding our belief in our humankind. The Post Office Workers who suffered such injustice needed 'a friend', someone who understood their circumstances and someone who cared enough to do something. Often, it takes just one other person to change things.

Memories of the railway at Bradley: Part 1

For over 90 years and across two World Wars, the Whitchurch to Tattenhall railway cut through Bradley. A fee of £20 was negotiated for crossing Bradley Common and, during construction, a powerful steam engine turned out 16,000 bricks each day at Mr Snow's farm in Tushingham. Opened in 1872, the branch line ran from Chester to Whitchurch, with stops at Waverton, Black Dog, Tattenhall, Broxton, Malpas, and Grindley Brook. Each day (except Sundays) 7 trains ran from Whitchurch, including the 38-minute mid-morning express!

"There was to have been a stop at Bradley (it was a crossing point for the salt run from Wigland to the canal) but they made it at Grindley Brook for the fishermen and the pub."

"We were the nearest house to the railway and the bedroom door would open when the fast train went through."

Originally planned as a 'short cut' goods route to Birkenhead docks, there were also local passenger services and the branch line transformed the rural area by enabling city commuting, daily newspapers, speedier mail delivery, and transit of livestock, machinery, grain, straw and other produce.

"My sisters biked to Grindley Brook Halt, left their bikes at a house and got the train to go to Broughall School as the road was

so busy with lorries going to the steel works near Chester."

"The last train at night from Chester to Whitchurch at 6.45 used to throw the evening paper out and a lump of coal; what a job to find that on a dark night! In return, payment was a rabbit (Granddad was the local rabbit catcher) which was always well received, especially in the war."

The first VIP to travel was Prime Minister William Gladstone, and the line was also used as an overnight stop by the Royal train during visits to the North West, when it would occasionally spend the night in the sidings at Malpas. King Edward VII (for Chester Races), George V (WW1), George VI (WW2), and Queen Elizabeth II with Prince Phillip, all travelled here over the years.

January saw a (planned!) visit from the fire brigade, who spoke to Class 4 about fire safety. Looking ahead, we have the inter-schools' handball, netball and indoor athletics tournaments coming up at Bishop Heber, plus the *Gotta Dance* showcase at Crewe Lyceum in March when Class 4 will be representing the school, guided by professional dancer, Chloë Hewitt.

Thanks to the support of parents and the local community posting their 'blue tokens' at the Whitchurch store, the Tesco grant scheme has awarded us funding support for the development of an orchard and vegetable beds. The orchard is already growing with apple, plum, and pear trees, and the vegetable beds will be developed in the summer term.

The dangers of pets with livestock

As a local farm vet, I have seen some of the damage that pets can cause to livestock first hand. According to recent statistics, around 15,000 sheep are killed in dog attacks every year and yet the culprit is rarely identified.

Dogs don't need to cause physical damage to sheep to have a devastating impact. Sometimes just them running around is enough to cause ewes to abort their lambs or even die of exhaustion. Over the last couple of years our family farm has had two separate attacks which led to three deaths and two severe injuries that needed veterinary assistance. All we ask is that dog owners stick to footpaths and 'take the lead' and keep dogs on leads around livestock.

Dogs can also carry a parasite called *Neospora Caninum* which is picked up by eating infected aborted calves or afterbirth. The parasite often doesn't cause any harm to the dog, but the eggs or 'oocysts' are shed in the dog's faeces. If a naïve cow ingests some of the dog faeces (which could easily be done in a field), this will cause the cow to be infected for life and makes her around 3–7 times more likely to abort her calf in the future. In beef or dairy farming, making sure a cow has a calf every year is important to enable her to stay as a productive animal in the herd. There is no cure or vaccine for *Neospora*, so cleaning up after dogs and not allowing them near deadstock is one of the ways pet owners can help.

On a similar note, cats carry a parasite called *Toxoplasma Gondii* which, like *Neospora*, is picked up by cats eating infected material. Obviously, cats are usually out alone and can stray for miles so we have less control over them, but it is something to think about if you live near a farm. With cats, the oocysts they shed cause abortions in pregnant ewes and can cause huge losses around lambing time. This is also a reason that pregnant ladies should stay away from in-lamb ewes as this infection can cross over to humans. Luckily, there is an effective vaccine available for this, but this is at an added cost for the farmer.

When one thinks of livestock worrying it is usual to assume that it only affects sheep, but cattle, poultry and goats can also be victims. There have been instances of dogs attacking cattle and causing horrific injuries and even death.

We want the public to enjoy the countryside and keep themselves, their pets and domestic livestock and wildlife safe. It is now recommended that if you are walking your dog near cattle and the cattle become aggressive, you should drop your dog's lead and leave the field as quickly as possible. Do not pick your dog up or keep it on a lead as the cattle will see you as a threat.

Please remember that if your dog attacks livestock you can face a hefty fine and a police record, which nobody wants. So keep pets under control and stay safe around animals.
