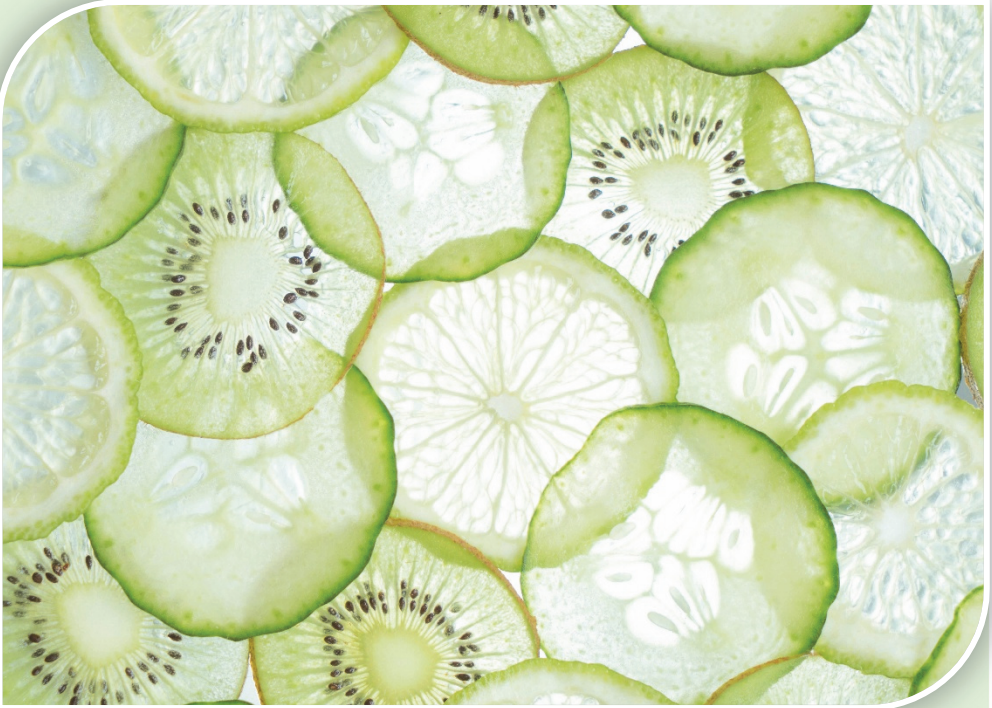

Chair's Report, May 2025

Great news for the village! Some much-needed maintenance is coming, thanks to recent Parish Meeting decisions.

First up, the church bells will finally get their long-overdue restoration later this year (see below). The original bell makers are on board to carry out the work, and the Meeting has allocated £1,000 to support the project.

Meanwhile, over on the Willeymoor Bridleway, some worn-out gates and fixtures are set for a makeover. The cost of hired labour turned out to be a bit eye-watering, so in true community spirit, locals David and Jason have stepped up to tackle the repairs themselves. With materials provided by the council and a £300 budget for the work, these gates should soon be back in top shape.

It's always great to see our village pulling together to keep things looking their best. If you have any ideas that could benefit the community, please send me an e-mail and we will discuss it at the next meeting on **7th July at 7 pm at Bradley Chapel**. So far on the agenda is a discussion about replacing the noticeboards, as well as a catch up on how the work on the defibrillator is coming along. Hope to see you there,

News from St Chad's

What if?

Are you living your best life? I met a delightful young person this week who would say 'yes' to this question. He travels extensively, has a job that many would dream of and has over a million followers through social media; yet we found ourselves in a field chatting about faith. The funny thing is, it

was the most natural thing in the world at that moment, and even though the conversation needed to end as he was catching a train to London, neither of us wanted it to finish! I spoke to someone older recently too, and a similar conversation took place. I remember saying to both, "There's much more to being human beings than we realise."

Being human is the most wonderful simple but complicated mystery – how do we define who we are, why we are, where we are? They don't teach this in schools as far as I remember, or college or university. It seems to me this is something we learn through living the experience of our lives. Piecing together the ups and downs, the traumas, the celebrations, the humdrum day-to-day things we learn to deal with. Key to this is time to reflect on those things – but sadly, very few of us do.

What if Jesus came to the earth to learn what it's like to be human? What if the One who created humans wanted to understand his creation? What if God realised that what he made needed help to understand themselves and why they were created in the first place? What if we are failing to live the best life we could?

'Because of the Lord's great love we are not consumed, for His compassion never fails. They are new every morning; great is His faithfulness.' In a time of fear and overwhelming change (circa 586 BC), the prophet Jeremiah wrote these words to a people who were struggling because they were human. These words are not empty words written to bring a little reassurance, but words of truth from a man who heard from God and spoke on His behalf, words of promise that gave hope.

If you are struggling with simply being human, is it time you reached out and sought the One who understands you better than you understand yourself? We are 'fearfully and wonderfully' made. Wouldn't you like to explore what that means? Wouldn't you like to know what God's plan is for each of us, for this world, for your children and their children?

What if – God is real? As real as you...

Thinking of that old Sunday School hymn, *Tell me the stories of Jesus*, I couldn't help but picture the scene of The Messiah, mounted on a donkey, riding into the city. I could almost feel the magnetism of such an occasion, hearing the cheering, "Hooray!" – or if you went to a pretentiously posh school "Hurrah!" The reality? The crowds, at the top of their voices, were

shouting "Hosannah! Hosannah to the Son of David!" – their prophesied deliverer from earthly domination. It's an understatement to say they were surprised at the *actual* message of Jesus – seeking to re-establish human reconciliation with Almighty God! **A message of loving support, tolerance and understanding.**

Roman Catholic Cardinals have been in Conclave and elected as successor to Pope Francis, American Pope Leo XIV. Said to be a reformer and a protégé of Pope Francis, it is not yet clear in which direction this new Pontificate will travel. In times of change, there's always uncertainty – the unknown. Change can be frightening, *but* it can also bring opportunities for new beginnings, new choices.

On Thursday 8th May we celebrated the 80th Anniversary of VE Day – World War II's Victory in Europe. Survivors still have vivid memories. Others of us, too young to have shared most of those wartime horrors, grew up in post-war times of upheaval and reconstruction, rebuilding shattered industries, villages, towns, cities and – not least – individual families. They were indeed *times of change* – for us, our 'there and then,' **but what about others currently experiencing their own terrible 'here and now'?**

Around the world today there are so many areas of terrifying horror. When asked to be supportive of peace, what is our almost automatic reaction? Usually that standard human response when 'buying into' a product, service or concept: "What's in it for me?" **Surely the answer remains in the eternal gospel message, as both a 'blessed assurance' and as a 'challenge'.**

MARRIAGE – On Tuesday, at Maesfen Church, Mr Johnstone, of the Mill Mow, was united in marriage to Miss Elizabeth Emma Faulkner, of Stag Hall, Bradley. The Rev Charles White officiated. The bride was accompanied by her father and brother; Mr Noah Parker, of Farndon, acted as groomsman, and Miss Mabel Wycherley, of Whitchurch, was bridesmaid. The bride was attired in a heliotrope cashmere travelling costume, with hat and girdle to match. The carriages were supplied by Mr Philip Dod, of Hampton. Numerous friends gathered to witness the ceremony. Stag Hall was adorned with flags, mottoes, and evergreens, and many tokens of respect and good feeling were shewn by a numerous display of useful and costly presents sent by friends from all round the neighbourhood. The happy pair started in the evening for Southport, previous to going to their new home, Heywood, near Manchester.

Local weddings

As we head into a busy time of year for weddings – including at our own St Chad's – here is a report of a wedding at that same church from May 1891, as described by the *Cheshire Observer*.

Not many present-day brides would be so bold as to wear heliotrope (purple) cashmere, with matching hat and girdle!

Czech state primary school at Maesfen Hall

In July 1945, 80 years ago, the refugee children of the Czech State Primary School left Maesfen Hall, which had been their home during WW2 (see photo).

What an exciting half term it's been, even though it was only 4 weeks long!

The sunshine has added to the fun of learning for all our classes, who have enjoyed outdoor lessons for many of their topics. Class 1 have been learning about 'growing' by eagerly following the development of their caterpillars into butterflies, and also exploring the world of seed and plants by taking part in *The Sunflower Challenge*.

Class 2 have learned about *The Great Fire of London* and visited *Weaver Hall Museum* where they were immersed in life in 1666. The children acted out what happened in Pudding Lane, met Samuel Pepys and tried their hand at some of the servants' jobs in the house.

Class 3 also had an exciting class trip to *Park in the Past* – stepping back into the 1st Century CE to learn what life was like for Roman soldiers. They went on a foraging patrol, took part in formation and combat training, and even dressed as Roman soldiers, complete with shields and spears. Back at school, they have been learning how to use globes and maps in geography (indoors and out), while another outdoor learning session focused on making fairground games using forces and magnets – even pulleying each other up into a tree!

Over in Class 4, they have been studying *Evolution and Inheritance* in science. They also participated in the *VE Day Big Assembly*, which they found both educational and inspiring, and together with Class 3 had a special educational visit all about Parliament, including a workshop to debate the topic: 'Should all children walk to school at least once a week?'

The Class 2 and Class 4 football teams joined in enthusiastically in the tournaments at Bishop Heber, with Class 4 working hard to earn a terrific second place. All members of Class 4 also successfully completed their *Bikeability* training, showing positive attitudes and impressive skills.

The icing on the cake is that all our Year 6 pupils demonstrated exceptional dedication and resilience throughout their SATs assessments. They are now proudly wearing their leavers' hoodies and looking forward to preparing for the end-of-year production and training for the upcoming school Sports Day (and Summer Fair) in the next half term.

School returns on 3rd June, and closes for the summer on Friday 18th July.
